They Speak Spanish!

Boy and Llamas

"Hola! Yo esta Norte Americano! Tu esta Centro Americano?"

These friendly words of fellowship and curiosity were some of the first uttered by Whitwort students upon their arrival in Centro, one of Central America's largest cities. The students, numbering around 30, are study-touring in Central America in order to experience the life there in Central America.

Central America, located just South of the Mexican border, is one of North America's closest neighbors. And yet, as many students are currently finding out, life is very different there. The country, which stretches as far south as the Panama Canal, is a land of many



different land forms, from snowy mountain peaks to dense, tropical jungles. It even has rivers and beaches. Farmland, too.

It has a varied history ranging from stone age peoples to modern societies, the ruins of which can even be found today. Many Incas lived there, tilling the soil by the sweat of their brows and feeding their llamas. This happened until they were all killed by Portuguese explorers.


But why are the Whitwort students in Central America? "They are in Central America," said Dr. Don Phrasebook of the Sociology Department, "to learn about the culture and the third-worldliness of the Third World."

Phrasebook said, in a telephone interview right from Centro, that Central America is actually made up of several small countries. The people all speak Spanish and other non-English languages, the weather is very nice, and everybody has sun tans.

And how are the students reacting to life in Central America? "One of the students wants to become the liason officer for the military government while others want to join the Sandinista Guerilla Movement. Everybody's glad they're not peasants," said Phrasebook.

According to Laura Sue Johnson, sophomore, there is a lot of poverty in Central America. "There are beggars everywhere and they always ask for money in their own language of Spanish.

"And the toilets don't have seats."



"They don't even bother to ask you in English. Once somebody did, though, so I gave him some money and it made him very happy. It made me feel happy too!"

Laura Sue said that the language barrier didn't pose too big a problem, except for when they first arrived. "When we got off the plane, someone went up to Steve Balsam and started talking to him in Spanish. Steve thought that the guy was making fun of him, so he slugged him. It wasn't until later that we explained to him that people speak Spanish here."

"It made me feel happy, too!"

Any other problems? "Well," said Phrasebook, "We have all had diarrhea, or Montezuma's revenge, all the time. And the toilets don't have seats. We've also had to haggle with the merchants so that we can get a good price for the souvenirs we buy."

Central America is a land of great contrasts, from north to south, east to west, and everywhere in between. "And that's why we're here," concluded Phrasebook.

pretty much sums up the entire College's attitude when he says, "I think we're over the hump now."


Psychology Department Improves

One exciting example of the curriculum improvements happening at Whitwort can be found in the Psychology Department. Starting next year, excited students will have access to a 'corrective guidance apparatus' being purchased by the college to use on the wayward elements of the campus. A grant from the Lillyof-the-Valley Endowment is making this posible. The new system includes a sonic emulsifier able to convert solid bone marrow into a fine powder and is said to be the latest in behavior modification technology. Already, eager and excited students have

volunteered to help run the complicated machinery, and some have even asked to be "corrected" and packaged into the small, corrugated containers that result at the end of the process. Franklin Wralph Unravels

Dr. Franklin Wralph, Director of the Harry N. Scowles Memorial Library, is taking a leave of absence next year as a result of his work with the poetry of Emily Dickinson, renowned American female poet of the late 1800's. Dr. Wralph is the leading authority on the Dickinson manuscripts and their disarray

after her death.

Dr. Wralph has been interested in Emily Dickinson since graduate school where he studied diplomacy and police work. When Harvard and Amherst College could not solve the problem of the insane disarray of the manuscripts that happened after Emily Dickinson died: enter Franklin Wralph. Painstakingly matching sewing holes, paper quality, stress impressions, the poet's handwriting, and other factors, Dr. Wralph started to solve the mystery of Miss Dickinson's own organization of her work. When Wralph finally finishes this maddeningly meticulous and time consuming work, a facsimile edition of Emily Dickinson's poetry will be printed and will allow readers of her poetry to see another odd aspect of the poet's work — her bizarre punctuation.
